My professional journey includes serving as a computer science professor at ESGIS private university in Lome, Togo, and managing the department of schooling in the same institution. In addition to my academic and professional pursuits, my commitment to social causes began during my time in middle school, where I started as a peer educator focusing on raising awareness about the AIDS virus and promoting preventive measures. Subsequently, I collaborated with the National Anti-drug Committee in Togo, working to educate the public about the dangers of drug use and abuse.

Driven by a desire to make a positive impact, I founded the non-profit organization JAD Jeunesse Anti Drug (Youth Against Drugs), dedicated to assisting individuals in overcoming drug addiction. Over time, our efforts expanded internationally, leading to the establishment of HOPE OF AFRICA in Brazil, aimed at aiding the homeless population.

Favorite Quote: "All things are possible if you set your mind to it."


What was the last thing or situation that made you laugh? Watching an old comedy movie or people watching always makes me giggle. Also, kids, I love being a nanny.

Community Health Outreach Worker, City of Portland


